Carl August Knuth

Carl Knuth was a native of Germany and was born February 10, 1837 at Wirshita, Garbowe, Province of Posen. He came to America in 1862 and shortly after his arrival he enlisted in Co. K, 32nd Wisconsin Infantry, and received an honorable discharge in 1865 at the close of the war. At the close of the rebellion he settled in Manistree, Michigan, where he lived three years, coming to Augusta, Wisconsin in 1868 and settling on a farm in Bears Grass Valley. He continued the vocation of farming until his death, and successively resided on farms in Bears Grass Valley, Thompson Valley, the Dells, to his late home in the town of Bridge Creek.

He was married to Minnie Lambrecht of Augusta, on July 6, 1873. Unto them were born thirteen children, nine sons and four daughters, all of whom survive, except one son who died in infancy. I (Beverley Knuth Gorkowski) received a letter from (Betty Knuth Baumann), P. O. Box 1873, Chula Vista, California 91912-1873. She stated in her letter that she had a Carl Knuth, coming over from Germany on June 24,1862 (alone), and he was listed as a laborer. It stated he (Carl) was 25 years old, and he sailed on the JOHN BERTRAM (ship). Betty stated that Wirsitz is now Wyrzsk, Poland, and Grabau is now Grabono, Poland.

Mr. Carl Knuth, a veteran of the civil war and resident of this community since 1868, died at Sacred Heart Hospital at Eau Claire, Wisconsin on Tuesday morning, November 4th, aged 76 years, 8 months and 24 days. Ulcer of the bladder was the cause of death and he had been sick but a short time. The funeral service will be held on Friday afternoon from his late home in the town of Bridge Creek, at 1 :00 o'clock to the Grace Lutheran church this city, Rev. Otto Braem, officiating.

John George Knuth

John George Knuth was born December 18, 1841, in Pommern, Germany and lived there until he was 25 years old. He migrated to the United States in 1866 and came directly to Manistee, Michigan. In the year 1870 he married Emilie Gasna and to this union four children were born, three sons and one daughter. One son died at the age of two weeks and another one at the age of 47 years. His wife preceded him in death in 1918 after 48 years of wedded life.

From Manistee, Michigan, he and his family moved to Wisconsin and settled down on a farm near Fall Creek in the town of Lincoln from 1872 until 1910 when they moved to Augusta, Wisconsin, where they spent many restful years from their labors.

Several weeks ago, Mr. Knuth was taken ill and he knew that at his advanced age his days were numbered so he prepared himself for the meeting with his God and Savior. He died June 6, 1934 at the age of 92

William Knuth

William Knuth passed away at his home in this city, Augusta, Wisconsin, on Tuesday, December 20, 1921 following a brief illness, the immediate cause of death being pneumonia, aged 77 years, 3 months, and 4 days. He, with others, went out to enjoy a few days of hunting in the deer season, caught a cold, but thought nothing until a few days before his death when it developed into pneumonia. Dr. Prill, who was in attendance, called Dr. Lyman of Eau Claire and it was thought he would recover, when suddenly he took a turn for the worse and failed rapidly until the angel of death in his infinite mercy, relieved his suffering and beckoned him home.

Mr. Knuth was born in Germany on the 24th of March, 1844. At an early age of 16, he, with his parents came to America, locating in Manistee, Michigan, where they lived for a number of years. In 1868 he was joined in the holy bonds of matrimony to Miss Augusta Behling of that city to which union, four children were born: Rosa, Anna, William and Tillie. Mrs. Charles Harr, now living in Douglas, Wyoming, and his wife remain to mourn his loss, besides eight grandchildren and his brother, John of this city.

In 1891 he, with his family, came to Wisconsin, settling in Ludington, where a fine farm home was built up by years of hard labor which was a joy to the little family, where nine years ago, owing to age and failing health they left the old farm and come to Augusta where they have since resided.

Mr. Knuth was ever a most worthy and highly respected citizen, just and upright in all his dealings, a loving husband and devoted father and his passing leaves a sorrowing home and wide circle of friends to mourn his departure.

Funeral services were held from the home on Friday afternoon, the Rev. J. M. Johnson of Fall Creek officiating with interment in the Augusta cemetery.
